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Numb by Hammerbox - Is it funny/good? I wouldn't know as I've just had it delivered and haven't even listened to it yet. I'll get back to you. What I do know is that two of its songs are most known for featuring on the first version of the PS1 game 'Road Rash' which is pretty cool. Yes, it is associated with speeding bikers hitting police also on motorbikes with either fists, clubs or best of all chains, (best because all you have to do is hold the attack button down to swing the things, rather than tap over and over), but violence isn't funny like Hammerbox (hopefully) will be. Let's hope the music and game aren't related at all. Now that I think of it, running over people in your car isn't particularly difficult, (unless they run away :S) but that doesn't mean it's fun, right? I don't know why swinging chains is entertaining in the game, but it is. I'm sure it's not because deep down I want to, just as I don't want to eat loads of mushrooms, go down pipes and and jump on tortoises. Though as this is supposed to a music review, maybe none of that matters.

You shouldn't hit criminal motorcyclists either, even if you're extremely curious as to what they will say to you after races. Usually they're very angry in RR at least. And you NEVER crash. I know because I've done it hundreds of times. It simply never gets tiring, despite what I said earlier). You have to hand it to the police in the game though - the way the same officers keep trying over and over to catch the bikers in different races is extremely admirable. Lesser people would be crippled by severe PTSD because of the beatings and extreme risks of death. (Or complex PTSD for those in the know). So much so they wouldn't be able to work. I'd also expect a certain level or paranoia, but whether the computer bikers are troubled is very hard to say, especially as you only see the their backs. Who knows, maybe if you saw their faces, they would look completely horrified.

Anyway, about the actual music. The guitar solos are a little bit scrappy in places, but I have heard much worse. As this stuff is grunge, that's not exactly strange. 'Ah grunge? You mean the genre where the vocalist is melodic, yet the guitars can do what the hell they want to?' Well I wouldn't go that far, but I know what you mean. Whilst atonal soloing does sometimes feature in grunge, atonal singing is far less common. (I think). I wonder why that could be.
