Today, I'll be reviewing Deftones's demo album 'Like Linus'! 'A demo album?? Demo albums suck!' Not this, one, it's SO good. You'll almost certainly only be able to find it on Youtube, but if you're one in a billion and own a copy on CD... it doesn't matter, you can find it on Youtube.
