Today I'll be reviewing 'Peace Sells... But Who's Buying', by Megadeth. First up, what does the title even mean? It's like someone saying 'I'm hungry... But I'm full.' Or 'The man was tall... Yet he was small;)'. To be fair, I do think those two examples have a nice ring to them (as does the album name), but the truth is, I was deliberately trying to be confusing. Not deep. However, I know for a fact (unless the internet has lied, which it might have done) band leader Dave Mustaine heard the phrase on TV and he thought it sounded pretty cool, so he copied it. I don't actually know if the musician even knows what it means, which is a strange concept. It would be like a musician hearing the phrase 'two minutes to midnight' and thinking it has something to do with partying late at night. (As I did). Actually the phrase refers to how close the world is to nuclear annihilation. Needless to say the hypothetical guy was WAY off and will likely cause offence or extreme confusion, if his use of the words aren't delivered in the right way. It would be like the performer going 'How are we all feeling?? In the mood for a party?? Well, it's two minutes to midnight!!', and the audience going 'You want to party?? We're all going to die!' The performer would be like 'Really? You sure? Sounded pretty fun.'
