Apparently 'Jar of Flies' by Alice in Chains is one of the most successful EPs of all time. Lasting 30 minutes, it's fairly lengthy for an EP. According to Wikipedia, the making of the EP followed AIC bassist Mike Starr getting fired for his drug use. He was then replaced by an OZZY OSBOURNE bassist?? Drug use surely couldn't have bothered AIC THAT much, that's all I'm saying. I'm not saying the new bassist used drugs with the solo artist, but come on. He must have done.
