Wow James, that's really impressive. We at the Institute of Super Speedy Typers absolutely LOVE speedy typers, which is how and why we replied to you so quickly. Lol. May I ask how long you've been speed typing?

JAMES types as he talks.

JAMES

Just a few days...

WIOSST

Wow. That really is amazing. Not only do we type things super fast at the WIOSST, we organise things really fast, too. How would you like to be on our TV show, tomorrow? Lol.

JAMES type-talks again.

JAMES

Lmao! Yes! Of course!

WIOSST

JAMES

INT. TV STUDIO - DAY

JAMES sits at a table, facing the smartly dressed TV HOST (30). They are in a stylish room with a cool city view out of the windows. A typewriter on a desk, with a seat next to it is behind JAMES. Cameras point at them. Behind the cameras is the 50 strong AUDIENCE of all sorts of people.

TV HOST

Hello, James. My name is Ben. My parents chose it because it's really fast to say. Literally since birth I've always had a passion for speed. However, when my parents discovered Ben was short for Benjamin, they sadly had a nervous breakdown and are now in a mental home. But let's keep things light. How did YOU get into speed typing?

JAMES

I just noticed I was a lot faster than anyone else. It surprised me, really.

TV HOST

Great! Well, we're a fast show, so let's see you speed type now! Come with me.

The TV HOST sprints to the desk with the typewriter on it. JAMES follows looking excited. The TV HOST pulls the chair away so JAMES can sit on it. He does so.

TV HOST

Ok, James. I'm going to say words as fast as I possible can, and I want you to type them up as fast as you possibly can. Ok?

The TV HOST takes a deep breath and jabbers.

TV HOST

Superspeedytypersareawseomelet'sallsa y'hooray'forsuperspeedytypers...

JAMES interrupts.

JAMES

Come again?

TV HOST

You're nervous?

JAMES

Damn right I'm nervous. I honestly don't think I've been more nervous.

TV HOST

And why is that?

JAMES

TV HOST
