Today, I'll be reviewing 'The Sinner Rides Again' by KK's Priest, and KK's Priest is a side project of Judas Priest's guitarist, KK Downing. It seems like the former is a perfectly reasonable name for a band, a good name for a Judas Priest spinoff even. However, Judas Priest is actually an exclamation, not a real priest. It's like a band calling themselves 'Oh My God!' and them having a side project called KK's God, it doesn't work because it twists the meaning. Unless 'KK's God' is an exclamation too, which it clearly isn't. Never heard of the phrase. Maybe KK's Priest wrongly think of Judas Priest as being a band based on a rather weird holy person. Now let's move onto the album title... 'The Sinner Rides Again?' I guess it's best if KK doesn't ask others to defend his faith as it kinda sounds a bit satanic. I mean people complain when bands supposedly put hidden messages in their albums when played backwards, such as the super vague 'do it', but yeah, actually defending Satan? That would annoy people.
